Dear Dr Collins,

We are pleased to announce that your article entitled "Flight Mechanics of the Ivory-Billed Woodpecker (*Campephilus principalis*)" will be published in PLoS ONE on Friday, December 12, with the press embargo ending at 5 p.m. Pacific Time (8 p.m. Eastern) on Thursday, December 11. On publication, your paper will be available online at <http://dx.plos.org/10.1371/journal.pone.0003920>.

There are two important items that now require your action.

1. Create a PLoS ONE account – so you can be ready to respond to user comments

Before your paper is published, please also create an account on the PLoS ONE journal publication site, if you have not yet done so; this is independent of the manuscript submission and peer review system. When your paper is published, you will then be identified as the corresponding author each time you annotate or comment on the paper on the PLoS ONE site. When creating your PLoS ONE profile, it is important for you to use the same email address you provided when submitting your paper so that you can be identified as the corresponding author. All other authors are, of course, also welcome to create an account and respond to any comments.

Most comments and questions on PLoS ONE papers are addressed to the authors. Thus, for the post-publication dialogue to succeed, it is essential for the authors to participate in the discussions and to respond promptly to readers' commentary. Most comments and notes are posted during the first week after a paper's publication. We therefore encourage you to visit your paper and to respond to comments about once per day during the first week and then occasionally during the subsequent weeks and months, as it is our intention that the discussion will continue long after the paper's publication.

2. Join the dialogue on the PLoS ONE site – use our dynamic post publication features

A further goal of PLoS ONE is to foster debate and discussion of the papers we publish. As such, we encourage you to read some of the other papers we have published and to be an active member of the rapidly developing PLoS ONE online community. Since our launch in December 2006, we have published over 3,300 papers. There are tools in place for all registered users to annotate and post comments on the online discussion section of each paper. We also have a user rating system whereby all registered site users can rate articles in three categories: insight, reliability and style. With this, we hope to bring in the subjectivity we have tried to exclude from the pre-publication assessment process in PLoS ONE. Once you have read a paper in PLoS ONE, we urge you to rate it as soon as possible.
